


Putnam County Family and Children First Council Shared Plan for SFYs 12-16

1. Identify any barriers in implementing the plan (i.e. data collection, data tracking, funding, infrastructure, etc.)

Putnam County has been very fortunate to have been the recipient of grants in the past that have made data collection and evaluation surrounding ATOD possible. We reported last year that although we could not report new information, we had received a new grant that would allow us to once again survey youth in all of our 9 county school districts. Unfortunately, that grant was never received, and therefore we once again have not been able to collect data since 2012. We have been able to raise the money necessary locally, and have ordered the PRIDE survey. This survey will be administered in the schools in fall of 2015, with data available late 2015. We WILL have new data to report at that time.

2. Identify any successes/how implementing this plan has worked to strengthen the council and county collaboration.

Developing the shared plan enabled many key stakeholders in the Family and Children First Council and the Safe and Drug Free Communities Coalition to collaborate and work together. It allowed many of the members to get-to-know each other and identify strengths with-in the coalition and council. Working together to identify the priorities, outcomes, and indicators also gave these groups a common goal and allowed the groups to identify community resources, agency programs, and community members within Putnam County that are available. In May 2014, we revisited the priorities and current strategies at the Safe & Drug Free Coalition meeting.

4. Identify any key findings (explanation of data findings; FCFC actions taken in response to key findings, etc.):

Total number of child abuse/neglect investigations in Putnam County in 2014; 106. Out of the 106; 72 were Differential Response, and 15 cases were substantiated traditional investigations. Of those 15, 4 neglect, 8, sex abuse, and 3 physical abuse.

Putnam County JFS has started using the Differential Response in investigating reported cases. This protocol has drastically reduced the number of substantiated cases of CAN in Putnam County. JFS has tried to increase awareness and education about child abuse/neglect within the community. JFS held an educational class on CAN that was open to the public in 2014, and also held a “Pinwheel” event on the courthouse lawn. JFS also worked to promote child abuse/neglect prevention during CAN awareness month in April, and FCFC helped to promote “Wear Blue to Work Day” within Putnam County to raise awareness.

Putnam County Project S.A.F.E. survey

Identify any key findings (explanation of data findings; FCFC actions taken in response to key findings, etc.):

This data has been presented to the Safe and Drug Free Coalition by the Putnam County Educational Service Center’s evaluator from Bowling Green State University. She credits the decrease in use to the collaborative prevention plan put in place by stakeholders who meet monthly. One key to this success is the implementation of an evidence based curriculum called Project Northland in all Putnam County Schools in 6th-8th grades. The county also has a comprehensive prevention plan that is a collaborative work to identify needs and gaps in ATOD prevention services. This Indicator will next be measured by the PRIDE survey in the fall of 2015.

Putnam County PRIDE survey

Identify any key findings (explanation of data findings; FCFC actions taken in response to key findings, etc.):

The 2012 PRIDE survey actually showed a decrease in the percentage of students that felt alcohol was harmful to their health. Upon reviewing the data, the evaluator for the Project SAFE data at the Putnam County ESC called the PRIDE office and inquired about our data. It was explained that the PRIDE survey re-worded the question and that this may have caused numbers to vary on a national level. This Indicator will next be measured by the PRIDE survey in the fall of 2015.
