 HB 289 goals remained consistent from one year to the next. However, the number of programs offered to youth increased from 10 to over 19 during this school year. Plus youth activities offer a wider array of options to younger children (as well as continuing efforts for older youth). Key finding: 29% of all the students in grades 5-8 had perfect attendance, were on the honor roll, and/or had zero write-ups. The substance abuse agency has implemented Operation Street Smart which includes a prevention class for elementary aged children. The energy and excitement about the programs for youth can be felt in the community: The youth have participated in a creek clean-up, they painted the bridge, they created a garden in an abandoned lot downtown, they decorated the storefronts of abandoned downtown buildings in Gloucester. Not only are there good activities for the kids, but there are many events for people in the community to look forward to like the Mud Volleyball Tournament, or Community Board Game Nights, or movies in the park.
