


# Carroll County Family and Children First Council Shared Plan Update for SFYs 17 -19 [Update 7/17]

X Strategies. The effort to identify recreation activities has been set aside. Early indications are that activities outside of school tend to be organizational activities 4 H; Boy and Girl Scouts; and church supported functions. When access is possible, resources are engaged in surrounding counties. There are no facilities based resources such as community centers, YM or YWCA, community located pools and the like.

**Youth Risk Behaviors:** OH Yes has encountered some initial issues causing delays in obtaining survey of our in county school systems despite their agreement and willingness to survey their respective students. There are duplicate inquires to the YRB Survey that has been offered to all Carroll Co public school students every 3 years since 1999. We are anxious to examine the OH Yes survey results to ascertain what can be utilized as ongoing comparative data and what OH Yes results may be seen as a new and important baseline of examination. So, at this point, we have no added data, neither baseline nor comparative to our last 2015 survey. 2018 will be what would have been a schedule to again survey students under the County administered Youth Risk Behavior Survey. Hopefully the OH Yes resource will be able to replace our old process and produce an even more enriched and enlightened information and planning resource for the county.

**School Success:** Other than the school-based pre-schools, the county has no independently operating pre-school programs. The county has one, operating day care center and, for virtually all of sfy 17 and now entering sfy 18, the county has been without an operational Head Start Program because of the lack of an approved facility (building location). It now appears that Head start may be able to commence programming close to the beginning of the 2017-18 school year. The county has one weekly newspaper with relatively low readership and no radio/television outlets in the county... Social media is the concluded upon resource for information to be made available to pre-school families/parents and to provide opportunity for some ability to answer questions and communicate through social media. The committee is challenged under these circumstances; however, added ECC members have been instrumental in developing ways to overcome these barriers.

**2. Identify any successes/how implementing this plan has worked to strengthen the council and county collaboration.**

Recognizing opportunitites to collaborate with other systems and all or portions of efforts undertaken by individual agencies has resulted in true collaborations to include sharing community supports and the participants involved in the planning and intervention programming.

Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) offered to all Carroll County Middle and High School Public School Students.

4. Identify any key findings (explanation of data findings; FCFC actions taken in response to key findings, etc.):  
 2015 represents the 3<sup>rd</sup> edition of the county wide YRBS results beginning in 2009. Our data has resulted in overall declines in identified priority youth risk behaviors. However comparison data with state of Ohio YRB results still place Carroll Co youth at rates higher than the state average. Therefore, we are continuing our focus on underage alcohol consumption/use, and suicide ideations.

**Shared Outcome:** Increase the number of children meeting kindergarten readiness criteria
