



Wood County Family and Children First Council Shared Plan for SFYs 17-19

Current FCFC Initiatives: Service Coordination, Ohio Children’s Trust Fund, No Wrong Door, Early Childhood Task Force (including Help Me Grow), School Age Task Force, and Trauma Informed Care Task Force. FCFC will provide early identification and intervention services and supports to families with multiple and complex needs; increase cross-agency services and supports available for children and families; identify and implement strategies and tools to reduce barriers in assisting students with success; coordinate and communicate FCFC agency initiatives targeted toward the adolescent and transitional youth population.
