

Too difficult to track every group that is held throughout the year for parents so have targeted the following groups:  
WIC education groups (4)- attendance increased by 13%  
Head Start parent meetings (10)- 75% increase  
Parent Connections hosted by CBDD and NCOES (4) – attendance decreased by 10%  
Family Fun Fair (1)- no change  
HMG events (12)- attendance increased by 37%  
Incredible Years (2 sessions) – attendance increased by 50%  
Identified that more people attend when incentives are offered

**6. Identify any key findings (explanation of data findings; FCFC actions taken in response to key findings, etc.):**

63% of graduating seniors in Wyandot County participated in ACT testing  
51% of graduating seniors took college credit courses during the high school year where offered  
Of the 5% who did not have a plan, 2% had applied to some type of education but were unsure if they were going to go; 1% were not going to college and had not secured employment yet; and 2% were graduating with no plan. Those 2% will be referred to FCFC to determine if they qualify for service coordination or wrap around.  
Of the 2% graduating without a plan, all were involved in the juvenile justice system.  
Primary increase in kids involved in juvenile justice system was alcohol related.
